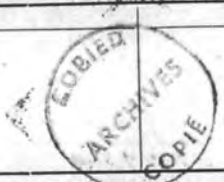

Dear Sir,

I have been interned to Switzerland as you might see by the heading of this letter. It is quite a change to get out of Germany. I arrived in this country the 28th. Dec. after spending over eight months in Germany.

I wish to thank you and the other members of the N.F.L.D. War Association for sending me parcels of food, clothing and tobacco, whilst I was in Germany. One could not exist on the food that we are getting from the Germans. We have plenty of frost and snow here and plenty of sport. I am enclosing two photos in this letter, one is a group that was taken near the station as soon as we ~~arrived~~ arrived at Murren. You will know me by my cap badge. The other is a photo of my hotel. I think that I have said enough for this time. Write soon.

With reference to your letter of August 26th and my reply of Sept. 2nd dealing with the matter of repatriation of your son, No. 2252, Pte. Bernard Hogan, I beg to inform you that as a result of our enquiries as to whether it was possible for repatriation to be obtained, we are advised by letter from the Record Office, London, to-day that prisoners of war interned in Switzerland are only sent to England if passed for repatriation by the Swiss Medical Commission. The decision in each case rests with this Commission and the British Authorities have absolutely no power in this connection.

However, according to the stipulations which have just been signed by the Germans, your son will not have very long to wait for repatriation to England.

as they were obedient, but
the Country's call was there
Now your Excellency you can
assist me, as I know you have

I am in receipt of your letter of the 2nd instant, enclosing envelope addressed to you by No. 2252, Private Bernard J. Hogan, who is at present a Prisoner of War in Germany. His address given in the last official report received here was Munster, Westphalia, Germany, but according to instructions regarding prisoners of war which were published in the St. John's papers some little time ago, all communications for Newfoundland Prisoners of War should be addressed in care of the Newfoundland Pay and Record Office, 58 Victoria St., London, S.W. Money can also be remitted through the same channel. For your information I would also state that the German authorities will not permit the sending of parcels by private individuals to prisoners of war in Germany, except in the case of Officers. The wants of Newfoundland Prisoners are, however, well looked after by the Newfoundland War Contingent Association, and by other organizations, and I am assured that three

parcels of food or clothing are sent fortnightly to each prisoner.

Your Excellency:-

Your very kind note of sympathy re the death of my dear nephew, Private Gerald Hogan, reached me on the 23rd inst. Please accept my humble thanks for your Excellency's kindness in my time of sorrow. The loss seems harder than if it were my own child, as the dear boy with two younger brothers were left to my charge when they were what I may term babies; as their mother died suddenly and also their father who died in Calgary, Alba. The boy who is dead (Gerald) is 21 years old, another, Private Bernard J. Hogan 2252 was with the Regiment and was taken prisoner April 14th, 1917 now interned in Switzerland. He went there 19 until October, and the third, Private John R. Hogan is with the Foresters-No. 8113-. He is only 17½ years old. He was working with or near his poor brother. It did not get either letter from him since the accident occurred. I know the poor dear boy will find it hard to have to work on where his brother met his death, as he is sort of a nervous disposition.

Your Excellency will see that I have had my share of trouble and worry. I have lost my health now on account of it. I reared the boys well with a noble heroic spirit as you will notice by their volunteering so young, before they were expected. They gave in their ages older than they were so as they would be accepted. I could have stayed them if I choose as they were obedient, but the country's call was there.

Now your Excellency you can assist me, as I know you have a kind, sympathetic nature by interceding for the releasement of one of the boys, either the boy who is in Scotland, or the boy who is interned in Switzerland. I think it but just that one at least should be spared. The boy in Switzerland



is done with fighting and why not let him come home as well as in Switzerland. I am sincerely confident that your Excellency wont treat my request as a mere nothing. How hard to lose my three dear boys to whom I was father and mother

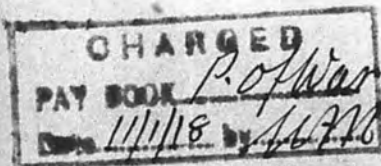

I have the honour to request that the case of the undermentioned man be brought before the Executive Government for a ruling.

2252 Private B.J. Hogan was granted a Course of Training by the Civil Re-establishment Committee for a period of six months. Hogan had only completed one month's course when he was admitted to hospital suffering from Pulmonary Tuberculosis. Last August this man made a request through the Soldiers Civil Re-Establishment Committee, Ottawa, that he be permitted to continue his training as granted by the old C.R.C., which was approved by this Department. His period of training as authorized terminates on April 30th. next.







The marginally noted man was examined at this Clinic 27/4/23:
Temp. 98.6; Pulse 70, Resp. 20, Wt. 144.

This man gives a history of having enlisted in the Newfoundland forces in 1916. Just prior to his discharge in 1919 he developed pleurisy and was sent to sanatorium for eighteen months. Three weeks after his discharge from hospital in Oct. 1920, he began a course in wireless telegraphy but he was unable to continue this because of the development of fever, night sweats and two small haemoptyses. He was treated in Kentville Sanatorium for about a year and was discharged last June as an "Apparently Arrested" case. He has been on 100% pension and has remained unemployed, leading a rather lazy life. He still has some cough and expectoration but this is largely confined to the forenoon. Occasionally he runs a temperature of 99 and even 99.6. He has been free from night sweats. His sputum has never been positive for tubercle-bacilli. His present weight of 144 pounds is 4 pounds less than on discharge from Kentville and some 21 pounds less than when he left the Newfoundland Sanatorium.

Patient is well developed but under-nourished. He exhibits facial pallor. Thoracic movement is restricted on the left side. Second degree impairment of resonance is noted over the upper third of the left lung and a lesser degree of impairment is found over the remainder of the left upper lobe and also the right apex. Over the left upper breath sounds are granular in type and over the upper part of both lungs breath sounds approach the bronchovesicular type. No definite intrapulmonary rales are heard.

Diagnosis: Pulmonary tuberculosis and pleuritis "Apparently Arrested".

I have your letter of June 27th giving authority to change this man's training to Cable Operating, but I regret to state that we were not able to find any opening in this work for him at the present time. The Cable Companies in existence in this city claim that reduction of work and staff does not permit them to accept a student at the present time.

For your further information, however, please note that this man is still 100% disabled according to the Medical representative in this Unit and Hogan is strongly advised to rest entirely until his next examination, which takes place some time in September. This man has really not had a chance to re-establish himself on account of his physical condition and I would ask that you be good enough to hold his case in abeyance until such time as he is physically fit to accept the balance of his instruction.

The type of work he now desires when physically fit to take it up is Dental Mechanics. The Eastern Dental Laboratory, Halifax, is willing to accept him, and after five or six months, take him on in a permanent capacity, providing he is successful. Of course at the present time, on account of his physical condition this type of occupation is out of the question, but if we are in a position to place him in this type of work later on when his condition improves, and providing the Medical authorities in this Unit approve of this type of occupation, have I your approval to start him to work when the opportunity offers itself both industrially and from his own point of view physically?

It is with regret I learn that the Bival Re-establishment Committee has gone out of existence.

I presented Mr. Legas, Vocational Officer, Halifax, with a letter this morning, that I received last October from Major Butler, while I was at the Nova Scotia Sanatorium, regarding me taking my course after I was discharged from the Sanatorium, he told me that he could not do anything for me until he got in touch with you. Owing to certain departments in St. John's been disbanded.

I would like to remind you that I was sent to Halifax to take a course in Wireless

Telegraphy and was taken ill less than two months after I had started to take my course. While I was at the A. S.

Sanatorium I wrote Major Butler asking him to change my course from Wireless to Cable, which he did. I immediately hired a typewriter and began to learn typewriting in my spare time between rest hours, which I thought would be a benefit to me when I was ready to proceed with my course.

I would also like to remind you that as I was a student and under age when I enlisted, and now that I have tuberculosis which deprives me of been able to compete with the average man in the labour market today. The only chance for me to regain my health and make good is to obtain vocational training. Trusting you will give this due consideration







I have the honour to request that the case of the undermentioned man be brought before the Executive Government for a ruling.

2252 Private B.J. Hogan was granted a Course of Training by the Civil Re-establishment Committee for a period of six months. Hogan had only completed one month's course when he was admitted to hospital suffering from Pulmonary Tuberculosis. Last August this man made a request through the Soldiers Civil Re-Establishment Committee, Ottawa, that he be permitted to continue his training as granted by the old C.R.C., which was approved by this Department. His period of training as authorized terminates on April 30th. next.

I am in receipt of a recent communication from the Soldiers Civil Re-establishment Comm., Ottawa, stating that Hogan has made very satisfactory progress but that the time granted to complete the course is far too short and suggesting an extension of five months in order to become fully informed in all the details of Mechanical Dentistry. It appears to me to be a waste of time and money unless Hogan can complete


