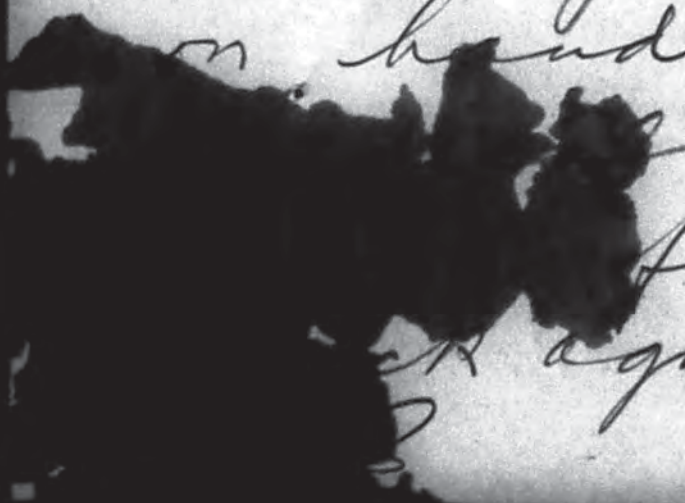

As seen by the Newfoundland Regiment.

Arras! It was late in the afternoon when we reached the place. We had been marching since 9 a.m. and were not sorry when the town came in sight.

We were not altogether surprised at its appearance. Everywhere were signs of the bombardment to which it was subject. The street-lines were plainly discernible and the framework of most of the buildings was intact, but they were all grim spectres of a French town within the area of war operations.

The Cathedral- beautiful suggestion of architectural grandeur in days of peace/-was a monument to Hun barbarity. The public buildings all bore traces of artillery work, as on every side one saw little but shattered walls, empty window frames and piles of debris.

My dear Leo Murphy,

I am so sorry that you have been hit and I fear the hit in your ankle is a serious matter. You cannot have better advice in the matter than you have had at Wandsworth and I hope that it will be fixed up as good as new.

I hold you as my special protege because in no other case have I been open to the opportunity of favouritism but I warned you when I helped you to attain your heart's desire of going on active service that you would not be able to see far enough or fast ~~enough~~ enough to keep out of the way of flying bullets.

I received four excellent letters yesterday from EyeWitness, who has for a long time been silent (this time they have all be published in the papers of yesterday and today) Excellent, more of the same please.

I have not received any list of honours for April 14th but I have received from the Army Headquarters a letter which should gladden the hearts of all Newfoundlanders. The writer is a kinman of mine and is perhaps the Marshal Berthier of his time. I hope your name will be in the list.

We have no news yet of the survivors of the two Companies which attacked a German division. There must be some survivors.

Cheerful note from "Eye Witness"
in France.

B.E.F.

France,

Nov. 25 | 1918

Two years ago I sent a message from the trenches in France! It was written with a full knowledge of the Somme offensive - written with the thoughts of bitter experiences just past and more intensive action in the near future - written with the loss of close friends still fresh in my memory and the recollection of a recent visit to certain 'mounds' on a cold, clear November afternoon vividly impressed in my mind.

To-day I sent a similar message, but it was under different circumstances. True, the poplar-lined roads of France were close at hand - the shell-holes made by an enemy force were not far away - but there was a remarkable difference. We have passed through familiar villages and have seen places reminiscent of hard fighting and bitter sacrifices; we have marched along the same paved roads with the dead leaves of a late Autumn still fluttering down - but there is a ~~marked difference~~ wonderful transformation! We have memories of towns and villages where females and very old men were the only occupants; we are acquainted with Cafes where an isolated light flashed through a half-curtained window, but it is different to-day!

French troops - Men from the British Isles - Colonials and American forces throng the streets - brilliant lights flash out from seductive amberges and cafes - from early morning to late night there is activity and there are crowds on the thoroughfares! The darkened shops have given way to bright Salons and although the afternoons are cool there are gatherings around the little tables so conspicuously displayed outside the French Hotels on the boulevards!

Meanwhile, the military organization moves along the same avenue! There are lines to be held and posts to be relieved - we are moving into a hostile country where only a few weeks ago the hand of everyone was against us, save those who were held hostages under the Prussian yoke - but as we move forward we are receiving greeting on all sides - every village, every home that is undamaged, flies a tri-colour or an allied flag; the few sacrifices, the forced marches, are nothing now, for we are advancing over conquered territory.

The air is full with the feeling of victory; it is apparent on every side, and we feel resolutely that the sacrifices have not been in vain; a ruthless foe has been conquered; a bullying ruffian has been brought to his knees!

Capt. Murphy, the "Eye Witness," describes
Some impressions.

B.E.F. FRANCE,
DEC. 12/1918.

Witnessing scenes of indescribable enthusiasm and jubilation, the First Battalion of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment has been with the first Colonial Troops to enter German territory.

When I joined the unit last month, the first preliminary steps in the journey towards the Rhine had been taken. The fine fighting Division to which we were attached marched to a new Town each day, rested at night and continued to advance on the following morning. Everywhere troops were on the move; Artillery, Transport and A.S.C.; bag-pipes skirling, Divisional bands playing and our own drum and bugle corps, under Corp. C. Dicks, sounded stirring calls as we swung along gaily into towns and villages where British forces had not set foot since 1914.

Every house, every building, boasted a tri-colour, but there were Union Jacks, Stars and Stripes and the other Allied flags as well. The gates and iron-work were ablaze with colour; triumphal arches were erected at intervals; banners of welcome crossed every street and

at each lamp-post a Kaiser was langed in effigy. At most of the larger towns a local band marched at our heads, and all the people thronged the streets cheering and singing; some wept, little children dashed into the ranks, shook your hand and disappeared into the surging crowd; women threw you flowers, men ~~threw~~ ^{threw} their hats into the air, and on every side were scenes of wild enthusiasm and thanksgiving.

The Glow of the Beast.

The civilians were most hospitable. The old days of fighting for billets and stables seem to have passed. Each family wanted to "mother" four or five of our boys; fires were burning and tea steaming; it was a remarkable contrast to the 1916-1917 campaign, i.e., draughty billets and leaky barns and lucky to get them.

We heard many stories of the sufferings and indignities to which the people were subjected while under the German regime. We actually saw two of the girls whose hands were mutilated by the beasts; others who had been openly mistreated; rooms battered and broken by German officers because they were

refused billets; memorial cards of civilians had
 shot by the invaders; school-furniture that
 been chopped and used as firewood, and
 many, many illustrations of barbarity and
 "Lecture."

Released prisoners.

On our march to one of the towns
 near Engis, on the Rhense, we met a number
 of prisoners taken by the Germans in the
 War. When the armistice was signed these
 soldiers were released and told to find their
 way back to England. They were not supplied
 with food or transport; merely sent adrift at
 the mercy of the country. Some of them were in
 a pitiable condition, but they were kindly
 treated by all the inhabitants of the villages
 through which they passed, so that when we met
 them they were beginning to pick up. I
 had a long chat with one of "Ours" — Private
 Frank Skanes of George Street. He was
 captured near me at Mondy-le-Preux,
 and has had a varied experience since
 then. He was looking quite fit and well,
 and the happiest member of the Party.

Verriers en fete.

King Carnival ran riot after our en-
 trance into Verriers, a town of 50,000 people
 about twenty miles from the German frontier.

Our visit synchronized with the visit of Prince Albert; a Regiment of the Belgian Army also returned to the Town for the first time since the War; all the Bands, fraternal and patriotic societies paraded, and there was a gala demonstration of extraordinary brilliance and national fervor.

At this latter function we met Mr. E. W. Stevenson and Mr. H. Perry Robinson of the London "Times." The last named correspondent wrote the splendid tribute to our Regiment after the Steubike engagement. He told me he was compiling some of the Division's efforts in the War, and he felt convinced that the work of the gallant 29th, with whom we fought so well, would stand out conspicuously in the history of the British Army.

Belge et France

It is truly hard to realize what Belgium has endured unless one has been within the precincts of the towns held by the Boche for a long period. Today - strolling along the boulevard - I was impressed with the many black-bordered papers, signed by the Maire, displayed in practically every shop window. They told a story - a very sad

and trying story - of civilians massed near L'Esplanade and shot down without mercy - of Auguste and Kathleen, killed at Fort de Chaudfontaine, 13th August, 1914, of other sacrifices; but when the allied troops entered the town the parental sorrow was forgotten. Their sons had gone; but long live their country!! The house in which we slept last night had lost three boys in these early days when the flood of Hun barbarity swept across the frontier; but ^{now} the doors were open wide, lights were burning in room and hallway, and a piano strummed merrily. It was a lesson in real patriotism.

To have been in the recovered streets of Brussels, Liege, Ypres; to have marched along into the conquered territory of Germany; to have witnessed with our own boys - the dawn of a day of final - and let us hope everlasting - peace, has been worth all the personal suffering; all the individual pain

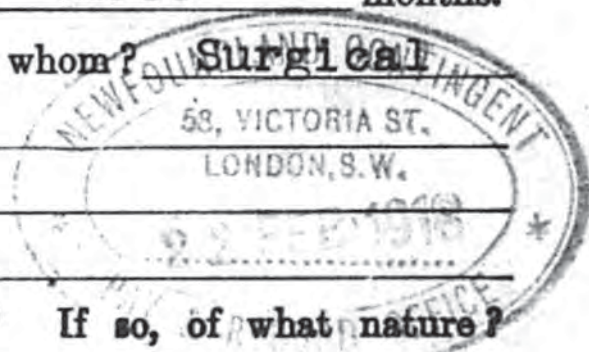



I have the honour to request, on behalf of the Food Control Board, that you will be good enough to arrange, if it does not conflict with other plans of your Department, for the bringing here, as soon as he is fit to travel, of Lieut. Leo C. Murphy whom we propose to appoint as Secretary to our Board.


Owing to the difficulties in the way of securing a really efficient man for this work we, as you know, enlisted your good offices some time ago with a view to ascertaining what his physical condition was, but the report being so unfavorable, we felt that it was not fair to himself that he should be brought out then.

Subsequently we agreed that I write Sir Edward Morris, who was familiar with the whole situation, and ask him to have a special medical survey made of Mr. Murphy, explaining at the same time the duties for which we wanted him here, and asking him to give the matter his personal attention and inform the medical officers of the reason for this step.

On Dec. 29th he wired us as follows;- "Waiting Murphy's medical Board to reply to you!" On January 2nd he wired again;- "Medical inspection Murphy. Can return in four weeks. Suggest retain vacancy as he appreciates appointment!"

From these messages it would appear that Lieut. Murphy would be fit to travel about the end of this month and that we might therefore count on his reaching here and being available for this position about the end of February, either on discharge, if found unfit for further duty by the Standing Medical Board, or by being seconded for this service through your Department.
