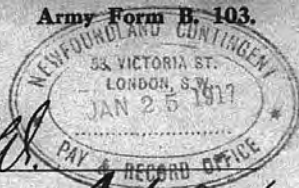

Notes.—(i.) 1st Board Feby. 21st/17.

States that since he was a child he has been deaf. He does not know how the deafness began, but states that he never had discharging ears. The deafness has become worse. He thinks it has become more aggravated since he went on Active Service. He was left in charge of billets when at the front, but went over the parapet with the rest on July 1st 1916 and was wounded and so sent back to this Country.

He is very deaf and only hears a loud shout at about a yard distant. The tympanic membranes are dull and somewhat indrawn, the left being markedly so. There is no evidence of perforation or discharge. His general health is quite good but he is quite unfitted for military work owing to extreme deafness.

Wounds of right arm healed, but some fragments remaining. Does not impair the use of arm.

2nd Board February 5th 1918.

Testing ears singly cannot hear ordinary speaking voice at all even at close range. With both ears can hear ordinary voice about one yard. Gets ringing sound when close over ear.

3rd Board May 11th 1920.

Still has some pieces of metal in right arm which weakens the arm for constant work.

Can hear ordinary conversation (slightly raised) at two yards distant.

4th Board, June 14th 1921.

Deafness persists as before. Arm troublesome as at last board.

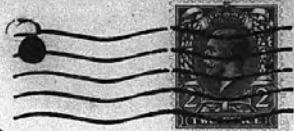



Sometime ago, I wrote
the Board of Pension Commissioners at St. John's
India, re my Original Pension, and requested them
to reconsider my case again, and I also furnished
them with a Medical Certificate to Prove that
my disability was no better, and in the opinion
of the Edinburgh Medical men, treatment of
any kind was useless, I have not yet received
any reply from them, and I have been
forced to get the Ministry of Pensions
in Edinburgh to take up my case, as
I am in desperate circumstances, and need
help at once, the Ministry of Pensions
have complete details of my circumstances
and other Public Officials that I
have interviewed in Edinburgh, have
pronounced the amount of Pension
paid me by the India Government

as Scoundrels, I have done my best all along to try and get along independent, and as long as I succeeded in getting employment, I was content to accept the meagre allowance called a pension from the Mfci Government, but now that my existence is threatened, as well as that of my dependents, I am asking for my full due, in consideration of my war disability which is **more** serious than Board of Pension Commissioners realize, unlike many a man, in the Regiment, who ran to the Board on the slightest pretext, and demanded all he could get, I have been content to take a back seat, and let things run their own course, I am clearly entitled to my original pension of 1917, plus increases under the new scale, or more, in view of my condition being worse ^{now} than what it was then. I was wounded in the head at the Sardanellas by a Shrapnel Ball, and my head has never been right since then, I have never been questioned about it by the medical Board, and consequently it has passed over, I was also wounded July 1st 1916 and have 3 or 5 pieces of Bullet in my right wrist & forearm which

Weakens my arm somewhat, my
Condition handicaps me so much
that I cannot find Employment
of any description, it is now nearly 3
years since I have had a days work, and
I have been struggling along on my savings
ever since, but I have come to the end of these
and am at present at my wits ends to

● Know where to get the means to support
my dependents, The Ministry of Pensions
advised me to get a Medical Certificate and

I would request your sympathetic consideration for the above named who is in extremely hard-up circumstances. His invaliding disability is Deafness and pension of 11/6 per week including, I believe, allowances for wife and two children, is at present in issue. He has a small business but through lack of capital it will have to be closed at an early date. It happens that the premises occupied by him in Guthrie Street have been purchased by an adjoining firm and Rose has had intimation that he must quit the premises in May, 1923. To get a house is utterly impossible but it is possible to rent a shop with living accommodation; this he would be pleased to do if he had the necessary capital for stock.

He is so deaf that he cannot get employment and must necessarily be in business on his account to earn a livelihood. His wife seems a capable business woman and undoubtedly sufficiently alive to her husband's business handicap to realize that her attendance is necessary in the business.

I am not aware of the entitlement awarded for his disability, i.e. attributability or aggravation, and the question of his re-examination with a view to increase in pension will have your consideration.

There is no doubt, however, that financial help is urgently required by Rose.

I am directed by the High Commissioner to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 27th January, regarding the above named Newfoundland ex-service man. Only yesterday we sent this man two pounds to assist him. He gets a small pension from the Newfoundland Government which he claims is not sufficient, and he has approached the Board of Pension Commissioners in St. John's with a view to having the amount increased, on the ground that he was assessed by the Ministry at 50%. His Medical History Sheet, however, discloses that he has been deaf from childhood and that the disability complained of, and which is extremely unfortunate, may have been aggravated by his service, but was certainly not attributable thereto.

I would be glad if you would be good enough to ask one of your visitors to call and see Mr. Rose and to recommend in what way he can be most usefully assisted. Any large grant to set him up in business we could not provide, but we can assist him to a limited extent, and I would be glad to have your advice as to how this can best be done.

The High Commissioner wants to do everything he can to help Mr. Rose, and if you will be good enough to co-operate in this matter it will be much appreciated; perhaps you can inform me as to what assistance would be given to a United Kingdom ex-service man by your Committee in like circumstances.

made honest effort to find employment in my line, without any success whatever, not alone at the request of the Ministry of Pensions, but from the date of my arriving in this Country in 1921. in fact I have tried for every kind of Employment in every way possible, but without any favourable results. My Wife & self and also my Parents in L^o are now thoroughly satisfied, that my prospects of making a living in Scotland, are remote, and are heartily in agreement with me, that my prospects of getting a independent living is in Newfoundland and not this Country. and mostly heartily approve of me going back to Newfoundland again, if You would kindly approve of this also, and are willing

to defray the cost of my Passage to
 Newfoundland, it would see the finish
 of all our troubles, and it would not
 be long before I had got on my feet
 again. My Wife has no wish to ac-
 company me, but prefers to remain
 with Her Mother until such a time
 as will be convenient for Her to
