

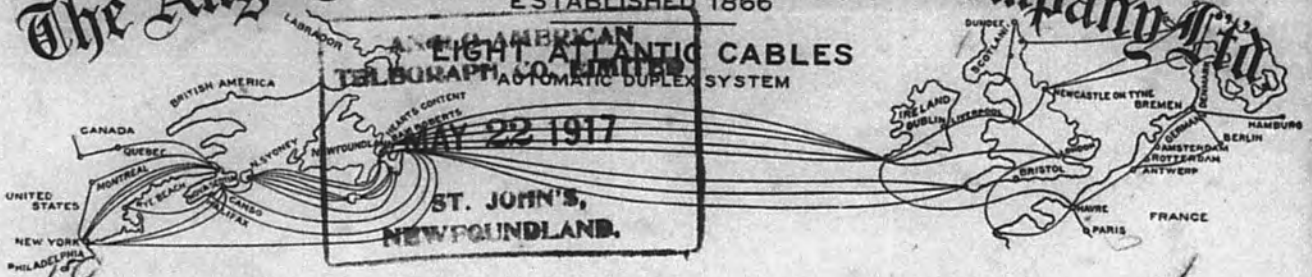

It came as a great shock to us, as this man had not complained whilst on the boat, nor had he attended any Sick Parade. Major Paterson, in company with Capt. Ross, visited the Armoury at 9.30 the night of the 21st. and no man complained of being sick. At 10.45 p. m. a telephone message was sent to Capt. Ross, informing him that Pte. Smart was very sick at the Armoury. He immediately got Lt. Procurier and proceeded to the Armoury, where they found Pte. Smart unconscious and having convulsive movements, and upon advice of the Medical Officer he was immediately removed to the Hospital, where he expired at 1.05 a. m. He was buried in the Military Section of Fort Massy Cemetery to-day at 2.30, with full Military Honours, the firing party and band were supplied by the 63rd Regt. Halifax Rifles. Two wreaths were supplied, one from the Officers, the other from N. C. O's and men of the Draft.

We had a splendid passage up, and every kindness was shown us by Capt. Martin and his officers. Mr. Jones' arrangements were perfect, and the men were well fed. They are very comfortably quartered by the Armouries here and Sergt. Butcher and his staff of cooks are giving every satisfaction.

We have been warned for May 30th.


