Dear Sir,

For some time past the Imperial Government have been making enquiries in relation to those men of the First Newfoundland Regiment who have been reported missing since the action of the 1st July. I very much regret to state, however, that from the correspondence which has taken place, a copy of which I enclose, it is evident that none of them are Prisoners of War in Germany, and the authorities are, therefore, reluctantly forced to the conclusion that all these gallant men, whose names are given in the enclosed list, and one of whom was very dear to you, were killed in that fateful action on the 1st of July.

I desire to express to you on behalf of the Government, as well as for myself, the sincerest sympathy in this time of sorrow. We feel the loss of our loved ones, but it will, no doubt, be some consolation to you to think that he, for whom you now mourn, willingly answered the call of King and Country, did his part nobly, and fell, facing the foe, in defence of the principles of Righteousness, Truth and Liberty. Though he has laid down the earthly weapons of warfare, he now wears the Soldier's Crown of Victory, and his name will be inscribed upon the Glorious Roll of Honor, and be held in fragrant memory by all his fellow-countrymen. When the victory is won, and Peace again reigns upon the earth, it will be a comforting thought to you that in this glorious achievement he bore no small part.

I trust that you may have the Grace and consolation of the Great Father of us all at this time.

With reference to the claim for Separation Allowance made by the mother of 1481 Pte. Frederick White, deceased, I would like to explain for your information, and in case the people concerned approach you on the subject, that Separation Allowance is payable only for the period during which the soldier actually was serving. Mrs. White explains that Miss Mary Young had the care of her child up to the date of Pte. White's death - she, therefore, would be the proper person to claim for Separation Allowance. I am sending her a claim form for a "Wife" and have asked her to see you about getting it filled up. I have also written to Mrs. White and explained the position to her.

The Pension Board advises me that they have paid on account of this child \$6.00 per month from the 2nd July 1916 to 31st December 1918, and \$8.00 per month from the 1st January 1919 onwards. This is the only allowance payable on account of a child of a deceased soldier. Edward White, the father of the soldier, is receiving \$20.00 per month pension, and these payments are the maximum which can be made.

I am sorry to say that you, yourself, have no claim for this allowance as the guardian of your son's child, because you did not have the care of the child until after Pte. White's death, and Separation Allowance is payable only for the period during which the soldier actually served. However, I think a pension is payable to you, and I am therefore taking up your case with the Board of Pension Commissioners. Up to the date of Pte. White's death, Miss Mary Young, the mother of the child, had the care of it. She, therefore, would be the proper person to claim for this allowance, and I am sending on a claim form to her to be filled out.

Dear Madam:-

Your letter of August 23rd has been received reference to the case of No. 1481 Pte. Frederick White. In connection with your claim for Separation Allowance, the ruling of the Board of Review is that for the two years that Mrs. Young had her child, during which time Pte. White was living, the allowance should be paid to her as she was the one to have expenses in connection with the support of the child during that time. The child was taken over by you after Pte. White's death. I would explain that Separation is only payable for the period covered by the man's service, no payment would therefore be issuable after the date of his death: and I regret that no allowance is now payable to you on account of Frederick's child.

I have spoken to the Board of Pension Commissioners concerning your case, and I understand from them that a pension will be payable on account of the boy to you as his guardian, until he is sixteen years of age. The rate of pension payable is of course fixed by the Pensions Act, and the Pensions Board can only follow their instructions.

I am returning the letters forwarded by you which were sent by your son to Mrs. Young.
